This week we return to Mark's Gospel after readings from St. John for the last month. We began the 'year of Mark' in January with Jesus' baptism, the proclamation of the kingdom, and then immediately the call of the first disciples, "follow me". People are struck by his teaching "with authority not like the scribes", and he seals it with healings that draw crowds of amazed onlookers. This all happens in the breathless chapter 1 of Mark. Then Jesus insists on withdrawing to pray, and moving on to other districts, "because that is why I came" (Mk 1:38). We are told that all this happened "after John (the Baptist) had been arrested", and the alert reader will spot the warning sign here. In these two ways Jesus will school the disciples: sticking to his mission as God's Chosen One; yet acting in a way very different to their idea of a triumphant Messiah.

In this week's Gospel he shows he is at home with the Biblical tradition by quoting from Isaiah, but demands his hearers focus on the purpose of religious practices rather than following the letter of the law. The traditions of the past are there to bring forward God's vision for the future. In the same way we received our faith from parents or similar figures who came before us; but it is a faith that looks forward and calls us to serve God's kingdom that is coming into being. In a fortnight Jesus will warn the disciples that this means offering our lives to God, but that it will give us our true life (Mk 8: 27-35).

On a personal note this will be my last weekend in the parish as I move on to St. Paul's, Haywards Heath. At a <u>much</u> humbler level this is the next step the Lord has asked me to take, as part of the mission we were all given when - like him - we were baptised. Thank you for the all commitment, friendship and understanding I have experienced during twelve blessed years in this parish community. *Fr. Raglan*

## AFGHAN CRISIS – HOW CAN WE HELP AS CATHOLICS?

It is easy to feel despair at the scenes of Afghan civilians trapped in the sewers surrounding Kabul Airport, those who could give humanitarian and military assistance finding it harder and harder to reach them as Taliban and IS-K forces strengthens their grip. Catholic media report that major Catholic charities such as Caritas International and the Jesuit Refugee Service have had to suspend activities in the country, and are now regrouping at the Pakistani border, their projects with the Afghan people in jeopardy. UK-based *CAFOD* is running an emergency appeal from its website, as is the American Bishops' Conference charity *Catholic Relief Services*, and of course, many other large organisations like the *British Red Cross*.

Maybe the best way for you and I to help is closer to home. The arrival of many refugees from the region in Europe is surely not a scenario that anyone would have wished for, least of all those who no longer have the choice to live fulfilling lives in their own land, faced with the prospect of a dictatorial regime. But as Christians, it is always our duty to help such people, and one concrete way of doing that is to provide assistance to those who have arrived on the continent, or here in the UK, and to provide solace in their grief. Most Afghan refugees arrive with nothing but a plastic bag containing their few possessions, and flip-flops on their feet.

There are many organisations to whom we can reach out. *Care4Calais* assists those in the camps on the French shore, along with *Secours Catholique*, which runs a day centre for refugees in Calais. Both provide bedding, clothing, footware, washing facilities, telecommunication, and legal aid to refugees, with the former also working on the UK side of the border. Care4Calais also has drop-off points for donations of food and clothing in Brighton and Dymchurch.

Manchester is proving to be a major location for the arrival, processing and homing of the new refugees. *Caritas Salford* (caritassalford.org.uk) has launched an appeal in the Salford Diocese, including the raising of funds, setting up collection points for necessary items for childcare (nappies, toothpaste, toys etc) and care for the elderly and vulnerable in particular.

All the charities above have websites which can easily be found with a Google search. Even if we cannot provide much help, let us never forget the most important work of prayer for our brothers and sisters who suffer, heeding the words of St James that we hear in today's Mass: "Pure, unspoilt religion...is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it..." (Jas 1:27)
