This Thursday, 11 February, we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. It was on this February day in 1858 that Our Lady first appeared to a little 14-year-old girl called Bernadette in Lourdes, France. At the beginning Bernadette simply called her 'the Lady' because she did not know who she was but a few weeks later, on the Feast of the Annunciation, this Lady revealed her identity with the words, 'I am the Immaculate Conception'. That small village of Lourdes, in the foothills of the Pyrenees, soon grew to be the largest place of pilgrimage in Europe. It is a place dear to many of us and has a deep effect on many who go there. It is a place of healing and miracles yet the greatest gift many receive there is the gift of peace, faith and renewed devotion to Our Lady.

After the apparitions, when Bernadette was asked again what happened, she said something that I've often remembered. She said that when the beautiful Lady looked at her, "She looked at me as if I was a person." Bernadette said that no one else had ever looked at her that way. To others she was just a girl from an insignificant family and well behind in her schooling. No-one had ever really looked at her. However, Mary looked at her and saw someone, a person. Bernadette never forgot the way Mary looked at her. To Our Lady she was someone.

Today, living with all these new restrictions – being told to stay home, isolate, wear masks, keep our distance, etc... - and maybe more aware than ever of our inner poverty - we may wonder, 'Who am I? Does anyone really see and know me?' The world might not see us but Mary sees us. To her we matter. As our mother she knows us, sees us, and loves us. Her sight reflects the eyes, heart and mind of her only Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ. To him each one of us is wanted, loved, and necessary.

Soon we will begin Lent again, a time of stripping away the non-essential. May we return again to two essentials for us as Christians – prayer and penance. Our Lady told Bernadette to do penance and pray the Rosary. I pray we may all learn to love this simple, profound and lifesaving prayer. *God Bless you this week*

GO TO JOSEPH!

Ite ad Joseph is a little Latin phrase meaning "Go to Joseph!" It is taken from Genesis 41: the story of Jacob's son Joseph who was sold into slavery, but ended up becoming viceroy of Egypt. When famine struck the land, the Egyptians begged Pharaoh for help, and he told them: "Go to Joseph and do whatever he tells you".

As Pope Francis points out, the phrase has, in Catholic tradition, become a sort of prayer referring to Jesus's foster father of the same name. "*Ite ad Joseph!*" we can say to ourselves whenever we hit a snag in the course of our day. It is like a quick glance, looking to our father for assurance. St Joseph is a practical man and a provider: he helps us to combat everyday difficulties and fix us minds on what is necessary to live a life dedicated to Christ. St Theresa of Avila would always "go to Joseph". She writes in her autobiography: "I do not remember even now that I have ever asked anything of [St. Joseph] which he has failed to grant... To other saints, the Lord seems to have given grace to succour us in some of our necessities, but of this glorious saint my experience is that he succours us in them all..." In all things, *ite ad Joseph!*

PRAYING FOR AN END TO MODERN SLAVERY WITH ST. JOSEPHINE BAKHITA



St. Josephine Bakhita, whose feast is on **8th February** was taken into slavery as a girl in Africa in the 19th Century and is the patron of all those who suffer the same in their lives. We pray for an end of modern day slavery - exploitation, trafficking and servitude of every distorted and wicked kind. Our diocesan steering group continues to work towards being able to launch a programme of raising awareness and seeks to bring like-minded people together in a network collaborating with other organisations. Anti-Slavery Day: This important event was created as a result of the Anti-Slavery Day Act, a Private Members Bill introduced Anthony Steen CBE, now Chair of the Human Trafficking Foundation. Modern slavery is a crime that often hides in plain sight. Anti-Slavery Day provides us with an opportunity to raise awareness of human trafficking and modern slavery, encouraging the government, local authorities, companies, charities and individuals to do what they can to confront the problem. Sunday 18th October Arundel and Brighton Diocese is providing supervised, temporary accommodation for victims of trafficking or exploitation, giving those affected by this terrible crime a place of sanctuary when it is needed most. This important initiative is the result of many month's work with Sussex and Surrey Police, with the accommodation provided by the Diocese intended as a safe haven pending a decision to enter the National Referral Mechanism. It is extremely difficult for people being trafficked or held as modern day slaves to escape the individuals and groups that control them. Providing a place of safety for victims of slavery and trafficking offers survivors the opportunity to re-build their lives in safety. The Diocese is involved with both Sussex and Surrey's Modern Slavery Networks, working with the police, local authorities, National Health Service (NHS) and other first category responders.
