Last week St. Peter was commended for being the first to see who Jesus really is. This is in response to two questions: “Who do people say I am?”, and “But you, who do you say I am?” They are questions that all of us face as well. Calling Jesus “the Christ”, Peter is saying that he is the promised Messiah, another leader in the mould of King David; adding, “the Son of the living God”, means that in Jesus our lives are meeting God. But we then face the question, of what kind of God it is that we are talking about. The “Christ”, or “Messiah”, would have suggested a victorious general like David, perhaps the one to drive out the Romans from Palestine. And Jesus ended the Gospel last week telling the disciples not to tell people that he is this kind of figure.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-1945) wrote on the 16th July 1944 when he was imprisoned for resistance to Adolf Hitler during the war of 1939-45: “God lets himself be pushed out of the world onto the cross. He is weak and powerless in the world, and that is precisely the way, the only way, in which he is with us and helps us”. And he added a note referring to chapter 8, verse 17 of Matthew’s Gospel: “this was to fulfil what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah, ‘He took our infirmities and bore our diseases’ “. Bonhoeffer commented: “this makes it quite clear that Christ helps us, not by virtue of his omnipotence, but by virtue of his weakness and suffering. Here is the decisive difference between Christianity and all religions. Man’s religiosity makes him look in his distress to the power of God in the world: God is the deus ex machina [a God who like a conjurer resolves distress by a magic trick]. The Bible directs man to God’s powerlessness and suffering; only the suffering God can help...this opens up a way of seeing the God of the Bible, who wins power and space in the world by his weakness”. Bonhoeffer was executed by the Nazi regime 23 days before the end of the war. St. Peter was to find his following of Christ reach its climax in sharing his Master’s death. In the Gospel this Sunday he shows that, having gained an insight into Jesus’ divine nature, he still had a journey to make learning what that truth really meant.

## 7 DAYS OF CREATION: *Preparing to celebrate 1st September as World Day of Prayer for Creation*

Greek Patriarch Bartholomew and Pope Francis have jointly declared 1 September World Day of Prayer for Creation. The encyclical of Pope Francis *Laudato Si'*: on care for our common home (LS) strikes a chord with all people of good will around the world. The Pope cited the environmental writings of brother bishops globally. For several years Cardinal Tagle of Manila and Archbishop Loy Chong of Suva have organised in their dioceses parish based liturgical prayer on creation during September. Recently, Cardinals in Burma and Papua New Guinea, and the Synod of Amazonia in 2019 have voiced their call for ecological conversion to be expressed in prayer and action. These 7 'Days' of creation can form a retreat or Novena over a period of a few days by going to a Columban Fathers booklet: *EUCCHARIST AND LAUDATO SI* [https://issuu.com/ecen.communications/docs/eucharist\\_and\\_laudato\\_si](https://issuu.com/ecen.communications/docs/eucharist_and_laudato_si); Alternatively, we will publish a 'Day' each week in the newsletter which you can follow. "Day One" gives thanks for 'A Provident God'. We can begin by naming a grace in our lives to celebrate – even with the difficulties that we all have too. God is always close to us, actively present in both cosmic and human history. *A reading from Genesis 9:9-11* – "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the Earth with

you, as many as came out of the ark, I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the Earth". In the Gospel of Matthew (6: 25-29) Jesus describes God as his Father and ours, and who cares for everything he has created: "look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?"

**Prayer:** God of all history, in loving kindness you formed an everlasting bond between your own self, Earth and humanity. You granted a covenant to your chosen people, guiding them on their journey and generously provided for their needs. In our time; may we witness to your blessings given for all the nations, remembering your deeds with joy as we sing your praise.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.
