**THE PARISH OF OUR LADY OF RANSOM**

‘Doom and gloom’ is the phrase that sadly seems to capture the current *Zeitgeist*: everyone is using it! As the UK heads into autumn—darker, wetter and colder days, overshadowed by the coronavirus, and other crises, it’s hard to shake off the general malaise. Autumn, of course, is a beautiful season – but October especially can seem too far from summer, too far from Christmas to lift the spirits. The modern commercialisation of this month, too, plays on escapism and the courting of dark forces (Halloween) which contributes, in my opinion, to its bitter aftertaste.

Yet for Christians even the darkest night is never totally so. The Church’s celebrations look beyond the natural cycles of growth and decay, to the supernatural cycle of the liturgical year: seasons of grace that blossom from the saving mysteries of Christ’s Incarnation, Life, Passion, Death and Resurrection. October, for us, is a luminous month, resplendent with feasts. To name a few: it is the month of the two great “Therasas”: of Lisieux (1<sup>st</sup> Oct), who taught us that even the smallest and most hidden sacrifices can be a joyful expression of love; and of Avila (15<sup>th</sup>). They are joined by other great saints of prayer like St Bruno, founder of the Carthusians (6<sup>th</sup>), and men of action, like St Anthony of Claret who fought against slavery (24<sup>th</sup>). It is the month of two great Polish saints of modern times: St Faustina Kowalska (5<sup>th</sup>) and St John Paul II (22<sup>nd</sup>), as well as of two Brits: St John Henry Newman, (whose memorial has just been ‘upgraded’ to a feast in England on 9<sup>th</sup> Oct) and St Philip Howard, Patron of the Diocese on 19th October. October also celebrates apostles Simon and Jude, and the Guardian Angels (2<sup>nd</sup> Oct). Above all, thanks to the presence of Our Lady of the Rosary on the 7th, it is an “autumn May”, a month of total dedication to Our Lady. Why not try to pray the Rosary every day for the month?

Finally, (Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> Oct) is the feast of Francis of Assisi, lover of poverty and true simplicity. Francis reminds us that Christians love nature and are deeply concerned with the state of this world - but they do not worship it or tie their fate to it. It is God the Father who is our Beginning and End; Christ, Our Saviour. Living in the world, we are submerged in decline: natural, political, emotional: but we should not allow ourselves to sink with it. In Christ, October is a month of victories, allowing us to glimpse the triumph over sin and death which has already been won for us.

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**NEW ENQUIRIES FOR THE SACRAMENTS OF BAPTISM, FIRST COMMUNION, CONFIRMATION**

At the moment we are giving priority to families who were preparing for sacraments this last year, 2019-20. We are happy to discuss making a date. Please note that guest numbers are limited. **For new enquiries**, we understand that many families are not yet coming to Mass with the uncertainty of Covid-19 still with us. Preparation for these sacraments will not be the same 'course' as in previous years. These are the steps you can take:-

- 1) Email the Parish Office to register an interest, with your contact details stating which sacrament you would like to register for. Remember to always give your full name and address and which church you attend.
- 2) The principal preparation is sharing in the Eucharist (Mass) in church each week. It is the source of grace for all the other sacraments. If in the present situation you are not able to come to Mass, do not to worry: we can wait, and you will not miss any 'deadline'!
- 3) Meanwhile you can join an online course we are beginning for families to explore their faith, and how we live it in the Church. Details will follow in the newsletter and online.

**FRANCIS OF ASSISI**

Do not trust in deceptive words and say, "This is the temple of the Lord, the temple of the Lord, the temple of the Lord!" If you really change your ways and your actions and deal with each other justly, if you do not oppress the foreigner, the fatherless or the widow and do not shed innocent blood in this place, and if you do not follow other gods to your own harm, then I will let you live in this place, in the land I gave your ancestors for ever and ever.

*In 1990 John Paul II named Francis of Assisi as the patron saint of ecology. Francis modelled a simple lifestyle while showing love to beggar and animals alike, kin to them all and the planets as well. He sang in celebration. We are pushed back to reflect again on the message of the Scriptures and traditional Catholic teaching about creation. Faith says that Earth belongs to God and we are but caretakers. Each part of cosmic creation reveals something of God's own self. We are to rejoice in the Earth as a gift of God's presence knowing that it offers praise to God by its very existence. Remembering the life of Francis has radical implications for the way we live and choices we make. His life calls us to act as peacemakers, respecting both people and all species on Earth as kin. He was transformed into a saint by simplicity and compassion, suffering and joy to personify Good News.*
